In 2016 Edward Street Child Services articulated the community's vision for the integrated early learning supports we want for our children and families. *Growing the Heart of the Commonwealth*, our latest publication, solidifies our community's commitment to create a solid foundation for children's growth and learning. It is the centerpiece of advocacy and action moving forward.

We crafted new collaborations with our regional partners, re-imagining how we can connect our resources in new ways to better support young children and their families. Our work with Worcester Reads amplifies our community's message of investing early as organizations, public schools, health professionals, and early education and summer learning programs all share a common goal to engage and empower families. The simple acts of reading, talking and playing are critical building blocks for children's lifelong success.

We also continued our direct work with teachers and the engagement of families with tools and resources to strengthen their own capacity. With support from the Greater Worcester Community Foundation our Master Teacher coaching program expanded its impact in classrooms and across the early childhood field with targeted professional development addressing children and trauma. We hosted our 5th annual Day of Play Family Festival engaging more than 5,000 children and families, expanding corporate investment and sponsorship of this celebratory family event.

Finally, thank you. It is through your partnership that our collective leadership transforms our community and creates the change we seek. Together we can work towards the day that all children open their doors to a world of possibility.

OUR MISSION

Edward Street Child Services is a private, non-profit agency dedicated to promoting the growth of children and strengthening families by improving the delivery of early learning services in greater Worcester through interagency collaborations, resource development and direct funding of programs designed to address the social, intellectual, emotional, and physical needs of children.



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ADVOCACY IN ACTION

Strengthening the birth to age 8 continuum of education and support for children.

Collaboration is one of Worcester's strengths. In 2015, Edward Street channeled that collaboration into a coordinated and integrated system that supports young children and their families. Edward Street led an initiative to develop and launch an innovative Birth to 3rd Grade Strategic Framework that brings together City officials and stakeholders from business, education, social services, health and mental health, and other key agencies to create healthy, dynamic and positive services and environments in which our children can thrive. The resulting framework, *Growing the Heart of the Commonwealth: Early Alignment for Children's Lifelong Success*, articulates a set of community principles and goals related to early learning, family engagement, health and behavioral health. The framework is galvanizing conversations and planning to align existing resources making new investments for children in Worcester.

COMMUNITY AND FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

Partnering to strengthen families as their child's first and most important teacher.

Now in its fifth year, the Edward Street Day of Play Family Festival is a one-day festival with more than 40 fun, interactive activities across six play areas which emphasize how young children learn through play. Held at Elm Park, this annual event attracts 5,000 people. A companion monthly newsletter highlighting a dozen activities reaches more than 10,000 families in Central Massachusetts. It takes a village to run an event of this size and we are able to offer the festival free of charge because of the generous support of local sponsors, community partners, and agencies who volunteer their time to make this day a success. Musical performances, art activities, an obstacle course, STEM and early literacy activities entertain participants large and small.

PROMOTING LEARNING THROUGH PLAY





PARTNERSHIPS

Enhancing community collaboration on behalf of young children.

Collaboration is at the heart of our work. Worcester has a tremendous array of community and cultural assets to apply towards its goals and aspirations, and to marshal to solve problems. Our community-based partnerships convene resources on behalf of young children and are designed to bring a collective voice to children's needs and their family's issues.

Early learning is at the table across a number of projects that more typically center on older youth, graduation rates, and self-sufficiency. Over the past year, Edward Street brought the lens of early childhood and the critical importance of early learning supports for young children to planning efforts across the City. We are advancing a framework for early learning that engages all sectors of our community from schools and organizations, to local government, to health care, to business.

When Worcester's leaders took an in-depth look at the challenges for Worcester teens involved with the criminal justice system, they found a majority of them had experienced or witnessed domestic or neighborhood violence as very young children. This led to an intervention strategy that is highlighting the partnership of Worcester's police and domestic violence prevention service teams to identify young children at a call site and provide supportive trauma response services to the affected family and children within 24 hours. Understanding the impact of early trauma on the subsequent development of young children through resources identified by Edward Street Child Services and the early education and care community is helping our City's public service providers change the potential outcomes for our youth in later years.

TEACHER CAPACITY

Strengthening early learning programs and environments for young children.

In 2012, with support from the Greater Worcester Community Foundation, Edward Street created a bold pilot to strengthen and elevate early educator performance through an embedded Master Teacher. Each year, the Master Teacher has the opportunity to collaborate with new teaching teams, identifying goals to enhance them as professionals. The Master Teacher provides coaching and feedback, modeling, curriculum resource support, problem-solving and in-depth training on identified topics. In 2016, the Master Teacher Project extended its impact to several infant/toddler teaching teams, responding to program partner needs.

The Master Teacher Project's work is highly contextualized. On any given day there are a variety of opportunities to engage and develop educators, none more exciting than when it happens in the classroom – in the moment.

One late September morning, a child approached the Master Teacher asking to learn about bats. Not in the curriculum plan but on target for following children's curiosity, the Master Teacher modeled an exploration with the child. Over the next several days, they explored bats using an iPad, books and conversation. What do bats look like? How many fingers do bats have? What do bats eat? Where do they live? Why are they out at night?...


Soon, more young scientists and explorers joined the investigation. A simple question transformed the classroom curriculum. By week's end the children were using their new knowledge and creativity to share their learning through dance, art, dramatic play, and drawings. The Master Teacher was able to model how to draw on children's interests to develop a rich and meaningful learning experience.
